Musings......March-April 2025

The impacts of our worship practices are to move us beyond the walls of the church. With a sprinkle of ash, we are reminded of death. With the lament of Isaiah, we are called to change behavior. With the tune of the psalmist, we are encouraged to see life in the strength of the Almighty. And in words of Jesus as written by Matthew, we are told how our religion and worship are to be accomplished.

Lent has arrived, like the proverbial thief in the night, unseen, unexpected, and yet offering opportunities to be more, to do more, and to serve more. And it arrives all wrapped up in a nice neat package of 40 short days, as winter begins her release and spring offers welcomed warmth and light.

Lent is unique in the church. It does bring characteristics which are not typically considered during other seasons. Lent brings an established time to pause, contemplate and return to better practices. Lent gives us an established world-wide occasion to repent for our lack of love and gives opportunities to return to God, refreshed, forgiven, and renewed. And the anticipation of Pentecost with its fire and wind will bring us into the life of the early church, sending us too out into the world to announce the good news of the Savior.

Prayer and fasting are not the only practices which we are called into during Lent. Service in the Name of Christ can also give us perspectives on the struggles and successes of our fellow humans. Volunteering for organizations which lift our brothers and sisters in their distress and anxieties is another way to celebrate the peace of Christ. Look around and see where the needs are, then do something! Visit a shut-in, take some time to help at a local nursing home, call our health advocate, Cathy Clouser for suggestions on where you can help. Living into service is a great way to focus on others, and celebrate the nearness of the Kingdom of God. One never knows what impact one can have!

Ash Wednesday Services - March 5, 2025



Summer Reading Camp 2025

Summer Reading Camp will be held the week of July 14-18 in the undercroft of Trinity. Our theme for camp this summer will be *Exploring Schuylkill County*. The campers will learn about our native heritage with Porcupine Pat, explore our waterways and rivers, and learn about the history of the Pottsville Maroons. All of these experiences will be coordinated with our classroom reading activities to provide the children with opportunities to have fun while improving their reading skills.

Approximately 30 children attend camp from the Pottsville and St. Clair Area Schools Districts, Gillingham, Assumption, and Schuylkill County Child Development. These children have experienced some difficulties with reading and have been referred by their teacher or reading specialist. Attending reading camp helps them retain the skills they learned during the school year by practicing their skills in a more relaxed, less pressure-filled environment than what they may encounter in school. Most of the children who attend camp return year after year until they age out after third grade.

The staff of Summer Reading Camp would like to thank you for your support of this ministry over the years. As we prepare for the new camp season, these are ways that you could continue to support us:

- Volunteer to spend some time with us as a classroom teacher or assistant. We need a few more volunteers this year.


It will then ask to confirm you want to receive text messages from Remind.

AARP DRIVER SAFETY COURSE 2025

Marion Price Trust will be sponsoring a safe driver's course this spring. Become a safer, more confident driver and by completing the course you may receive a multi-year discount on your auto insurance. You can refresh your driving skills and knowledge of the rules and hazards of the road, while also reducing your chances of receiving a traffic violation or getting into an accident. The AARP Driver Safety Course is specifically designed for drivers aged 50 and older.

Some things that will be covered in the course include:

- *Research based safe driving strategies
- *Information on the effects of medication on driving
- *Preventative measures to reduce driver distractions
- *Techniques for handling left turns, right-of-way, and roundabouts
- *State-specific rules and regulations including construction zones, child safety seats, school buses, cellphone use and more

There have been changes made to the curriculum of the course so we will be offering the full 8-hour course, not the refresher class. This will also open the class up for people who have never taken the course before. The course will be held at Holy Apostle Episcopal Church, 307 E Hancock St. St Clair on Thursday, April 24th, and Thursday, May 1st. On both days the class will be held from 8:00 AM - 12 noon. The class is open to the public and the cost of the course is \$20 for AARP members and \$25 for non-members. MPTF will cover the cost for Episcopalians. TAX-AIDE PROGRAM FOR SENIORS

Diakon Community Services, a nonprofit organization based in Pottsville, is partnering with the AARP Tax-Aide program again this year. Tax-Aide is a free service that is available to taxpayers with low to moderate income, with special attention to those over age 60. This service is by appointment only. All taxpayers must provide a photo ID and social security card. AARP only prepares simple returns and can handle pay from a job, Social Security, pensions, dividends, interest, capital gains/losses, property taxes/rent rebates and more. They cannot handle income from rental properties, debt forgiveness or out-of-state returns.

Appointments can be made for Feb 7th through April 4th at 23 Meadowbrook Center, Route 183, Schuylkill Haven. To schedule an appointment call Diakon at (570) 624-3018.

SCAM ALERT!!

Utility Scams- Each winter, criminals pose as utility company representatives, claiming missed payments and threatening to shut off service unless payment is made immediately. If you receive a surprise call like this hang up the phone. These scammers hope to create panic long enough to get a payment from you.

Unknown number- Don't answer unknown numbers, as it could be the start of a scam. Let the phone ring and have the call go to voicemail. If you choose to answer, let the caller speak first as many scammers use an auto dialer that connects to a live person when the call is answered. That brief delay before the caller speaks could signal a scam. Check with your service provider for options on blocking scam calls. Remember that when someone is offering something "too good to be true"It probably is!

The Best Things In Life

Some people say that the best things in life are "free". Others will argue that having everything good in our lives like a home, children, a car, and travel vacations can be quite expensive. Actually, both options are correct. One opinion applies to material things and the other applies to things of nature and gifts from God like the breath we take, a rainbow, a waterfall, the oceans, the mountains, etc. The Charles Baber Cemetery wholly embraces the theory that the best things in life are free. After coming off a hard frigid icy winter, the months of March, April, and even May, are a testament to the many gifts of nature that await the visitor. The days are longer, birds can be heard singing in the trees or seen hopping on the ground in search of worms. Squirrels are scampering playfully up and down the trees. The sun seems to sparkle off the leaves and grass. The biting wind has gotten warm. The icy rain is now tepid. The entire cemetery is aglow with the pastel colors of Easter.

Our Easter colors are most noticeable with the fuchsia flowers on the many red buds that have been planted in the past 5 years. They can be found inside the 16th St. entrance, in a small line inside the main gate to the right, and near the little spring at the bottom of the hill. Next, we have the flowering dogwoods and the kousa dogwoods dispersed throughout the property. They are in varying shades of white and pink with the kousa flower pointed and the flowering dogwood curved. Then we have three kinds of cherry trees. Our real old ones, the black cherry, with barks that look like crushed burnt cornflakes are very tall and thin and their tiny white flowers are way up high at the top of the tree. We have the kwanza cherry on the east side of the pond with a double-bloom pink flower. We have one weeping cherry to the right of the main entrance with long strands of tiny white flowers that sway gently in the breeze. New to our property are the Japanese ivory silk white lilacs. We have two older ones by the barn, but the new babies are at the top of the inside stone wall. There are a few callery pears with their white blossoms by the barn. Near the main entrance, there is one coffee tree with tiny white flowers, one sprawling magnolia with huge white and pink flowers, one horse chestnut with its long coneshaped tiny yellow flower clusters, and one mature tall tulip tree with yellow flowers with a green band that looks like tulips. Later in the Spring, the Siberian elm by the Comloquoy mausoleum develops clusters of tiny pale cream\yellow disk-shaped flowers with the slippery elm having light green disks.

Around the chapel and going down the hill, our sunset red maple leaves sprout as dark burgundy bunched floral clusters that give way to red and yellow catkins before changing their leaf coloring to green. Our many other older red maples have growing leaves of crimson and burgundy while the Japanese dwarf maple grows lacy green leaves that don't change to burgundy until the fall. Throughout the property, our red, white, pin, swamp, and chestnut oaks and the box elder all have dangling catkins of assorted strand lengths. The sassafras, sweet gum, and black locust have dangling floral clusters that sometimes look like catkins. Other trees like the lindens have leafy bracts with dangling yellow-greenish flowers, while the Norway and sycamore maple have dangling flowers like the lindens, but without the bract leaf.

By the chapel, we have purple azaleas. And in the mulch bed around the chapel, we have red tulips and yellow daffodils. Our ground is covered in violets, buttercups, and tiny blue flowers that I don't know their name. Unfortunately, by summer the ground is loaded with thousands of dandelions. Do take the time to notice the many flowers growing in the Scatter Garden. Particularly pretty are the thick clusters of white flowers that surround the angel in the middle section of the garden.

Come and enjoy the Spring Easter colors and partake of the best of the free things in life.

Memorial Day

Each year for many, many years, our 580 Veterans' flags were replaced by Pottsville's 4th grade students. The flag replacement by the students was always followed by a program explaining the significance of Memorial Day, prayers, the playing of taps and a 21-gun salute by retired volunteer veterans. Since COVID-19 and because of a decrease in available servicemen, this is no longer done by the school district. The Leo club helped for two years but is now defunct. Last year, Mark Weise, a dog walker, and 8 Facebook volunteers replaced all 580 flags. We are hopeful that we can get Mark and his band of volunteers to help us again this year.

Arbor Day

We plant 6-10 new trees every year for Arbor Day. We offer them at a sponsorship of \$400 per tree. The tree can be in memory of or celebration of someone or something. A new baby tree costs about \$140 per tree. The money difference between cost and sponsorship is what is paid to the tree-cutting company to remove dead or diseased trees or dangling snapped limbs. Last year between a windstorm, snowstorm, and mini tornado, the cemetery incurred over \$20,750 in tree damage with only 50% covered by insurance because the branches fell on memorial markers.

Our Arbor Day tree celebration and blessing is on <u>Friday</u>, <u>April 25th at 2PM</u>. We will be planting 6 trees this year. The trees will be assigned on a first-come, first-sponsor basis. The 6 baby trees will be blessed by the Rev. Dr. Kurt Kovalovich. It is a beautiful and environmentally gratifying service and is open and free to the public.
